I watched them from a chair in my yard as they worked tirelessly with the utmost efficiency. It was my entertainment for the day and the following morning as well. It was truly a thrill watching them build something so large without hardly breaking a sweat. Within two hours the walls were up and mostly stable when the trusses arrived. A large crane hoisted them onto the structure while the men nailed them in place. Before I

could blink, the trusses were secure and the roof was being laid down, shingles and all. Another team from the group were installing the windows while still another team attached the siding to one of the sides. The sun began to set with the roof complete and the building stable for continued work the next day.
